- Classical Studies can serve as good preparation for graduate programs in economics, law, public administration, international affairs, management science or business.
- Although there are few "Classics" careers, a BA may be sufficient academic training for a variety of positions in the arts, government and politics, communications, and other business positions that require a broad based education in human institutions.
- Gaining relevant experience through part-time and summer jobs, volunteering or internships is critical.
- With the addition of education credentials, social science graduates may qualify for teaching positions in secondary and elementary schools.
